Not that I am recalling, no.

- A. John F. Green.
  - Q. What were the circumstances?
- A. Mr. Green had also been a renter. He is a friend, erstwhile friend. I know his family. We go back a long ways together. We have had, let's call it, a parting of the ways. He owed me money which he refused to pay. I knew there was a warrant for his arrest. So I went down to see him, and I told him he would either go back to Washington and face the music, or I would call the police and let them know he had a warrant. It was strictly vengefulness on my part at the time. So he came back to Washington.
  - Q. What was the falling-out that he and you had?
- A. I am not quite sure. We haven't gotten to the bottom of it yet. I think it is like trust issues mostly. He is somebody that I still see. He came by and visited me at my office last week. I wouldn't try to make much out of that. I know that he was included in the --
  - Q. Sir, I am not --
  - A. I am still answering.

I wouldn't make too much out of it. I know he was indicated as a basis for the affidavit of probable cause in this criminal cause, and I know that affidavit was drafted by the prostituting attorney without ever having contacted him, and, when they did contact him, which was during the week of the trial, he denied all of the allegations he

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1 had made in some police report from who knows when, when he 2 was mad at me. So there is no truth to what he said. And you can feel free to contact him even today. ο. How old is Mr. Green? 4 5 Α.

- Mr. Green was born in '64, '65. He was telling me how it feels to be 28, 29. He is something like that now. He had a birthday at the end of the year.
- 0. Have you had any sort of sexual relationship with Mr. Green?
  - A. No.
  - Q. Where is Mr. Green today?
  - Α. He lives in the Port Townsend area.
  - You met with him last week, you indicated? Q.
- He stopped by wanting to know -- just we are kind Α. of social friends. He had checked in. We were social friends. And he had asked if I knew where he could make some money working. It was during office hours. He is the brother-in-law to my secretary. So he is a person that I have contact with every now and then.

We had a very difficult time when our friendship, relationship, in 1991 I believe it was -- he was making all kinds of accusations to all kinds of people in a manner that he knew would hurt me. That is what he threatened to do. He threatened to destroy my reputation. He attributed me for the fact that he was facing a year in jail for

driving without a license for umpteem times.

- Q. At the time you went to Oregon, he owed you money, correct?
  - A. Right.
- Q. Was it your purpose in going to Oregon to get that money?
  - A. No. He told me he wasn't going to pay me.
  - Q. Why then did you go to Oregon?
- A. I figured, if I wasn't going to get mine, he wasn't going to run free.
- Q. When you arrived in Oregon, did you discuss with him the fact that he owed you money?
- A. I don't think we did. I think we only discussed whether he was going to remain free.
  - Q. Did he then get into your car?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q. Why?
- A. Because I told him I would give him a ride to Oregon, or I would call police or wherever that was. It was somewhere outside of Beaverton, I believe, where he was staying. I mean, there were still hard feelings between us. I told him, I said, "Look, you come back to Port Townsend to face the music or I will call the police here and it will be a month before you get back to Washington but you will be in custody all of that time being transferred from jail to

HATTER/Tay 1 jail." I was being very mean. 2 Α. 3 5 Mr. Green? Α. Q. Α.

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- - What was your purpose in going to Oregon?
- Just to give him a hard time. You only get into things that way with people you have been close personal friends with. I am not proud of that or anything like that. That is just where our relationship was at the time.
- How did you know there were existing warrants on
  - I was in court when they issued.
  - When you say you were in court, what do you mean?
- I was seated in the courtroom in Jefferson County when one or more of the warrants issued. Jefferson County is just a part-time court. It is one or two days a week; everything happens.
  - Were you sitting as a pro tem judge? ο.
- No, this is well before that time, well before Α. that time.
  - This was approximately 1991, was it not? Q.
- I think he went to jail before I was Α. Yeah. offered the position as a pro tem judge. I know he made some statements in 1991, but those were all after the fact.
- Q. You were accompanied by someone going down to Oregon?
  - Uh-huh. Α.
  - Who was that? Q.

HATTER/Tay A friend named Jay, Jay who I haven't seen in a while, Pearson, P-e-a-r-s-o-n. ο. Where is Mr. Pearson today? Α. He is in the Seattle/North King County area somewhere. I know his family and his extended family. He is not a person that I see very frequently at all. What does he do for a living? I think he is a cashier at a convenience store. Α. don't know where. That is what he has done as long as I have known him, since he has been out of the service. Did you discuss at the time you arrived in Oregon Q. with Mr. Green, if he didn't pay you the money, you were going to see that he was arrested?

- Α. I didn't discuss the money. He had left me a note before he left Washington that said he wasn't going to pay. I believed him. I have known John a long time. He -you know, no, there was no discussion about money or else. I have -- I have other remedies for that which aren't worthwhile. He had actually executed a note to me. I still have the note. It is worthless.
  - In any event, he got into your car along with Q. Mr. Pearson?
    - Α. Right.

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- Q. How did you know where he was living in Oregon?
- I asked his mother. I know his entire family. I Α.

have known them for years and years and years.

Q. You had your stun gun with you on this trip to Oregon?

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- A. Yes. It was in the car, yes.
- Q. On the trip from Oregon back to Washington with Mr. Green, did you fire the stun gun?
  - A. No.
  - Q. You deny that?
  - A. Yeah, I deny it.
- Q. Did you display the stun gun to him?
- 11 A. Yes.

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- Q. In what purpose and for what reason?
- A. Well, just to intimidate him.
  - Q. To threaten him?
    - A. No, not to threaten him. There were no words associated with it. A lot of what we did was to just screw with his head. We had very little conversation with John. I would say, by the time we got back up to Kalama, he was thoroughly convinced this is just kind of mind screwing. He was thoroughly convinced we were going to do something to him, and he, in fact, asked, "What are you guys going to do, beat me up?"

And we laughed at him and said, "Is that what you want us to do?" We didn't do anything to him except kind of mentally terrorize him. What happened with the stun gun is

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I had it under my seat, and I picked it up making sure that he could see it, and I gave it to Jay and told him to put it in the glove box. I never threatened him with it. Did you have handcuffs present with you on this trip to Oregon? I didn't but I think Jay had a pair. Α. Whose handcuffs were they? Q. They were Jay's or some that he had gotten. Α. pretty sure they were his. Q. In any event, you knew he had those with him? Α. They are up on the -- I don't remember if they came up when we got back to Washington or what. They were there, though. See, a police officer came and did an investigation, so we produced those. ο.

- The reason the handcuffs were present, was that a part of the non-verbal intimidation?
- Α. Yeah. Yeah. It was stupid and in a vengeful sort of way that you can only get somebody that you know really well. It was kind of fun at the time. It was the only means of retaliation that I had at the time. It was just to frighten him.
- Mr. Green, it sounds like, at least from your perception, thought you were sincere?
- Mr. Green surprised all of us because, when we got to Washington, he ran to the telephone and called the Lake

Forest police and told them, "I have a warrant out for my arrest; come and get me."

So I don't know what he believed. We just asked him to talk. As I said, at one time, he had convinced himself we were going to pull off the highway somewhere and physically abuse him in some kind of way.

- Q. Was it your goal to put him in that state of mind?
- A. Yeah, I think so at the time. Not necessarily that we were going to do physical harm, but that there would be uncertainty and just to see what would happen. We were just having fun with him.

The fact that he called and had himself arrested was actually the most unanticipated and funniest thing that happened. I know that made him feel the worst because we laughed at him publicly. That was very embarrassing to him. You know, things escalated farther -- further between us after that.

- Q. How so?
- A. Well, he made allegations when he was in jail.
- Q. What kind of allegations?
- A. I didn't find out until -- and I have never seen the reports. People were approaching me at work, and the jailer, fellow attorneys and so forth, some clients that I had were in jail telling me that "John Green was telling me all of these awful things about you." No one would ever

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give me details. They said it wasn't worth repeating.

At the time of the trial last year, my attorney showed me a police report which I think it was dated some time in late '91 where he was claiming that I was diddling or having sex with young boys in Port Townsend. So that was just a further thing.

Before he was jailed, ultimately, I mean, he would stop by my office over there in Port Townsend and say, "I am going to destroy your reputation." I am going to get people to say this about you. I am going to get people to say that. I think the reports, if you have a chance to look at them, kind of speak for themselves. He makes these allegations, and, when the police ask him for details, he doesn't come up with anything. That is just part of my past that happened.

- Q. On the trip from Oregon back to Seattle, was Mr. Green, in fact, handcuffed?
  - A. No.
- Q. When you arrived in Seattle, you stopped and picked up a gentleman named Scott Kelly?
- A. He was a friend of Jay's, if we are thinking about the same person, who I hadn't met before. I think that is who we are talking about. But I think Scott Kelly, if that is the gentleman, was there when the police officer came to arrest John.

- Q. Why is it that you stopped and picked up Mr. Kelly?
- A. I don't know. Just an idea we had, more intimidation.
- Q. You wanted to increase the non-verbal intimidation factor with Mr. --
- A. At some point, to give you an idea of how little we talked about it, at some point John asked us where we were going. We had never said anything. We were just going to let it go. He had assumed we were going to Port Townsend. I had no intention of going to Port Townsend coming up from Oregon. I was just going to go home.

As we said nothing and after we made this stop, I think Mr. Scott -- Mr. Kelly lived in Lake City. He just had less and less a clue of what was happening, and we really had no plan.

- Q. Where is Mr. Kelly today?
- A. I don't know. He is not a person I really knew before or since then. At that time I believe he was a housemate of Jay Pearson's. But Jay has since married and has kids.
- Q. How is it that you chose Mr. Pearson to accompany you down to Oregon?
- A. Oh, because Mr. Pearson is like a Baby Huey. He is like six-five, 230 pounds; he just looks intimidating.

He is a big guy.

Q. And he is intimidating by his physical presence?

A. By his physical presence, not anything about his behavior or what he does. He is the kind of person that you would hire -- he is actually mild-mannered. He has and I think he told me in the past that people have been willing to hire him as a bouncer in taverns.

- Q. Not the kind of guy you would want to run into in a dark alley?
  - A. Well, no, not by his appearance. No.
  - Q. So it was based on his physical appearance?
- A. John didn't know Jay. John didn't know Jay at all.
- Q. That was another reason why you decided Mr. Pearson would be a good one to take along?
- A. Yeah. That is not all of it. I have done some things I am kind of embarrassed about. I mean, my initial ploy to get John to come back was to tell him his boy was sick and had been in a car accident. I am not proud of that stuff. This is just a way to get him back here so he would end up in jail basically.
- Q. Did you tell him his boy was sick and had been involved in an accident?
  - A. Yeah. Yeah.
  - Q. And that wasn't true?

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A. That wasn't true.

Q. If you knew where Mr. Green was, why didn't you simply call the police and say this man is at such and such a location in Oregon and he has warrants out for his arrest? Why did you not contact the police and tell them that?

- A. Because, with friends that are angry at each other, it is more important to see what happens to them. That is all I can say to explain it. I mean, that way he wouldn't have known who did it or instigated it.
  - Q. So you mean if you had called the police?
- A. I could have had the same effect by calling even the Lake Forest Park police if they had time to relay the message down. I forget the name of the town, somewhere near Beaverton. It would have had the same effect.
- Q. That wouldn't have been as much fun as having him know?
  - A. Right. Right.
  - Q. The four of you arrived at your house?
  - A. Right.
  - Q. And you left Mr. Green unaccompanied for a moment?
- A. Well, even before then. We had stopped to use the restrooms along the way. We stopped at the public things along I-5. The little rest stations. We stopped at those.

No, but as soon as I opened the door, John bolted for the phone and called the police. He had had it to his

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wit's end at that point.

- Q. Did he call 911, in fact?
- A. Right. Right.
- Q. What did he say? Were you listening?
- A. He said they are trying to kidnap me. They are going to do this to me. They are going to do that to me. He was fantasizing.
- Q. That is the state of mind that you had hoped to induce with Mr. Green?
- A. I don't know. We really didn't know what would happen. Yeah, that is obviously what had developed. We were willing to go with that. It was more teasing. That is what really made him angry. He can't stand to be teased. There has been a lot of teasing.
- Q. There is teasing where you kid someone, and then there is escalating levels of teasing. This probably would be at the top end of the scale, would it not?
- A. Yeah. Yeah. I mean, you know, something you probably wouldn't do with someone you didn't know or probably you wouldn't do with someone that you knew even because it was kind of like over the line. I mean, with your close friends and acquaintances, one aspect of them being close is you know intimate things about them and you know how they respond to things and what they are sensitive to and you have tacit agreements with these people that you

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don't cross those lines.

Well, we had both crossed those lines with each other before then, before that time, and this was more escalation of the same. It continued for quite a while until we finally made amends last year.

- Q. One of the things that happened, to my understanding, is, when you got to the house, you asked Mr. Kelly if, quote, "the room was ready"?
  - A. Yeah.
  - Q. What did you mean by that?
- 11 A. I don't know. It was just, you know -- the room
  12 -- I don't know. There was nothing.
  - Q. It was just one more step in the --
- 14 A. Right.
  - Q. -- intimidation campaign?
- 16 A. Right.
  - Q. What did Mr. Kelly say in response?
  - A. I don't know. I mean, John went right for the phone. That was it.
  - Q. He went for the phone after you said, "Is the room ready"?
  - A. Yeah. We had already discussed this, what we were going to say and what we were going to do when we got to my house. Our intent was to send him off howling and nuts. We never expected that he would call the police to have himself

- Q. When was this discussion?
- A. When we picked up Mr. Kelly. Because Jay and I had talked about -- I mean, Jay and I had talked like when we stopped at the rest area; I want to say Battleground -- somewhere on I-5 between Portland. We had stopped to use the restroom and we were having cigarettes. At this point, John had already asked if we were going to beat him up. So Jay and I kind of made an agreement we would keep teasing him.
- Q. You came up with the idea of asking Mr. Kelly, "Is the room ready"?
- A. Yeah, let's stop and get Scott, his roommate, and figure out something.
- Q. How was it that Mr. Kelly learned what was happening?
- A. As I remember, we went in -- well, I don't know exactly what Jay told him. Jay went into his house. We stopped there briefly and went in, and, I mean, I think he was probably approached, "Do you want to just have some fun screwing with a guy's head?"
- Q. Was it your perception that Mr. Green was in fact intimidated by what was happening?
  - A. It is possible. I don't know.
  - Q. That was your goal?

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- Our goal was to tease him. I mean, after all, he asked were we going to physically harm him, and we told him We answered the question with a question. We said, "That is not what we were planning to do, but is that what you want us to do?" So it was just kind of left open. Q. Just kind of --I never laid a hand on him and never intended to. Α. You were just trying to --Q. I mean, physically, he could take care of me, but Α. our relation -- that is something that I always actually teased him about. You know, just nothing physical ever happened between us. You were trying --Q. A. I figured it was okay to push it. Q. You were trying to raise his uncertainty level? Α. Yeah, and to make him angry, tease him.
  - Q. And his anxiety level?
  - Α. I don't know. I don't know. It happened.
  - Are you sure, Mr. Hatter, that you didn't shoot Q. the stun gun at him?
  - I am positive. You can ask him. something that he told the police in the report? I didn't hear all of their conversation.
  - It appears in the police report, and, in fact, according to the police report, you might have actually shot

1 | yourself by accident with the stun gun?

A. One would know that. I mean, I never have in fact, but, from what I understand happens, it will burn you or something.
